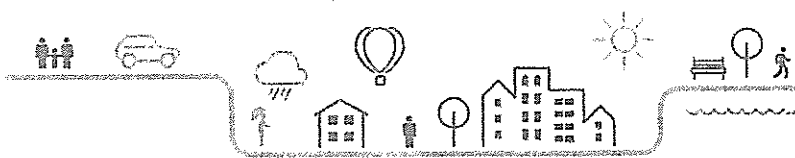

Put in a controlled crossing on Cobham Drive near a garden entrance for the safety of pedestrians and cyclists.

Targeted rates always hit lower income people and superannuatants the hardest – so why are you doing it?

Stop selling pensioner housing and ensure Hamilton has well designed and affordable housing for the growing numbers of older persons and those on lower incomes.
